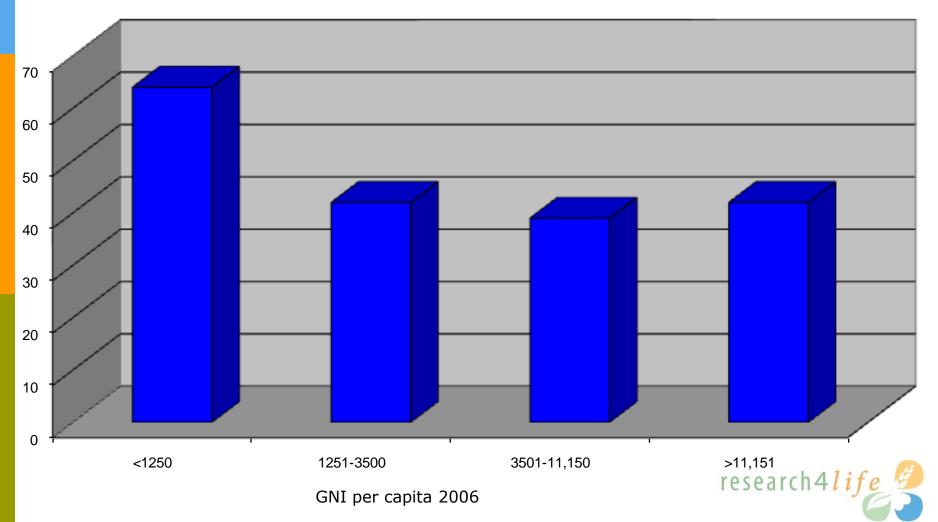

Research4Life - Background

Study conducted by UN in 2003:

- 75 Countries with a GNI less than US\$1,000, 56 % of medical institutions had no subscriptions over the previous 5 years.
- Countries with GNI between US\$1,000 US\$3,000,
 34 % had an average of two subscriptions per year.





Research4Life: Closing the Information Gap

- WHO and Yale University HINARI in 2001
- FAO and Cornell University AGORA in 2003
- UNEP and Yale University OARE in 2006
- WIPO ARDI in 2009
- Now a partnership with 130 commercial and nonprofit publishers and technology partners
- Commitment beyond 2015.

Eligibility for Access

Band 1

- Publicly funded and not-for-profit institutions in countries with per capita GNI of less than \$1250
- Free access to journals

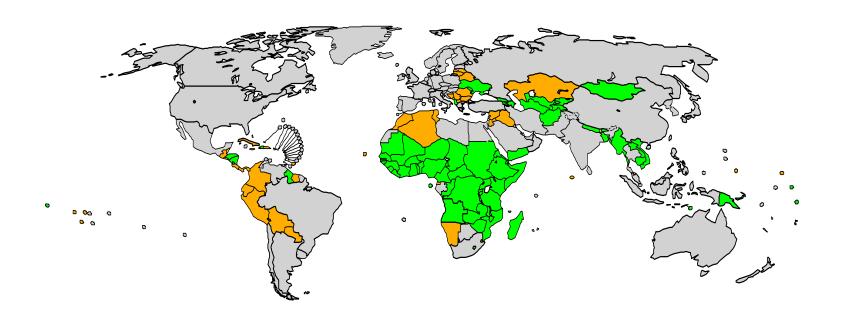
Band 2

- Countries with per capital GNI of \$1251 to \$3500
- Access to journals costs \$1000 per year per institution
- Income invested in local training initiatives

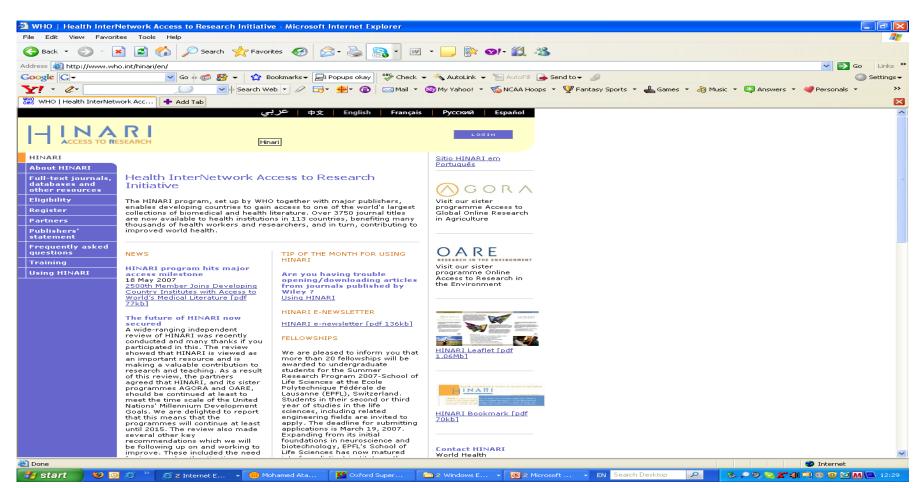

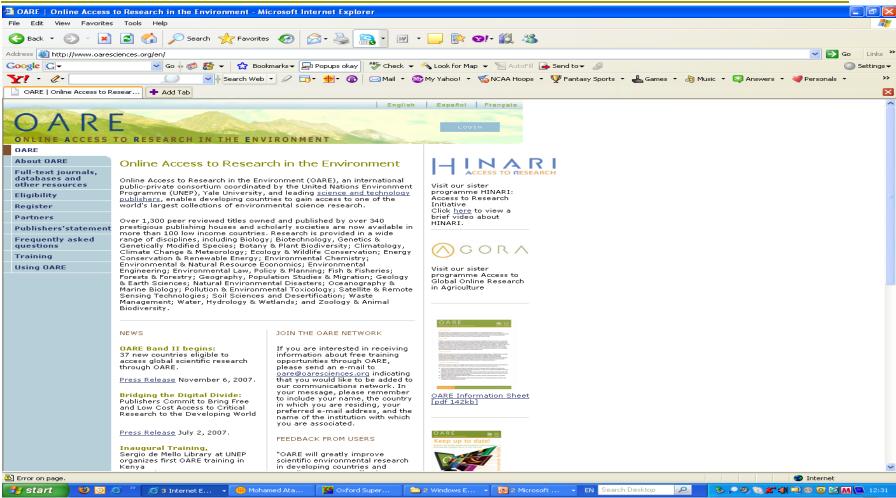

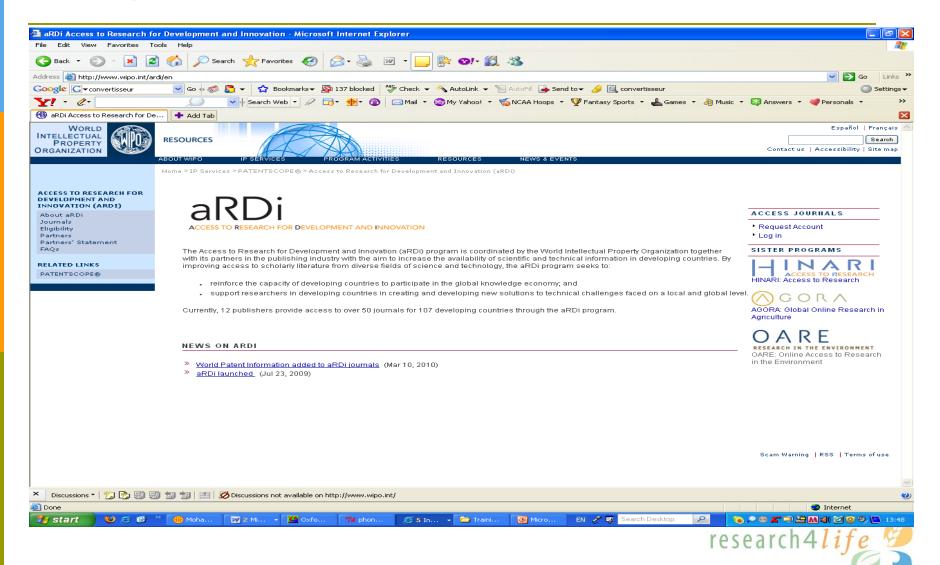

 - 2010: Morocco, Tunisia, Syria, Rwanda, Zambia, DR Congo

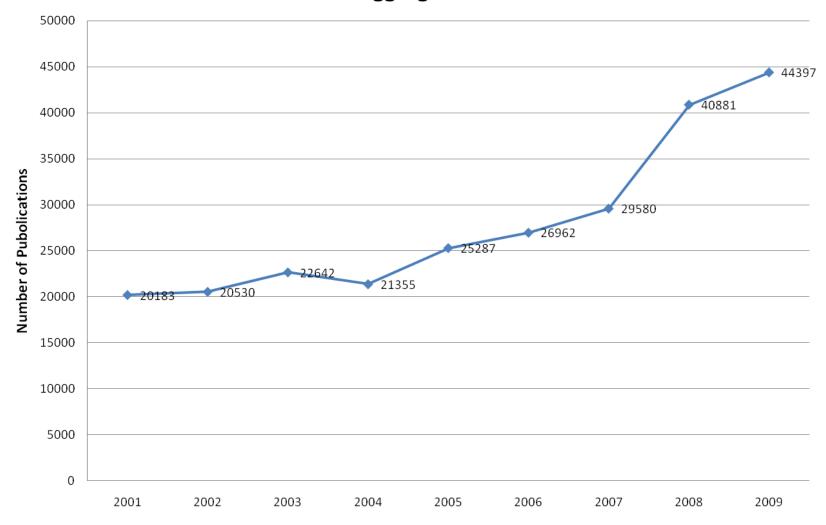




Training Workshop – Mozambique, 2006

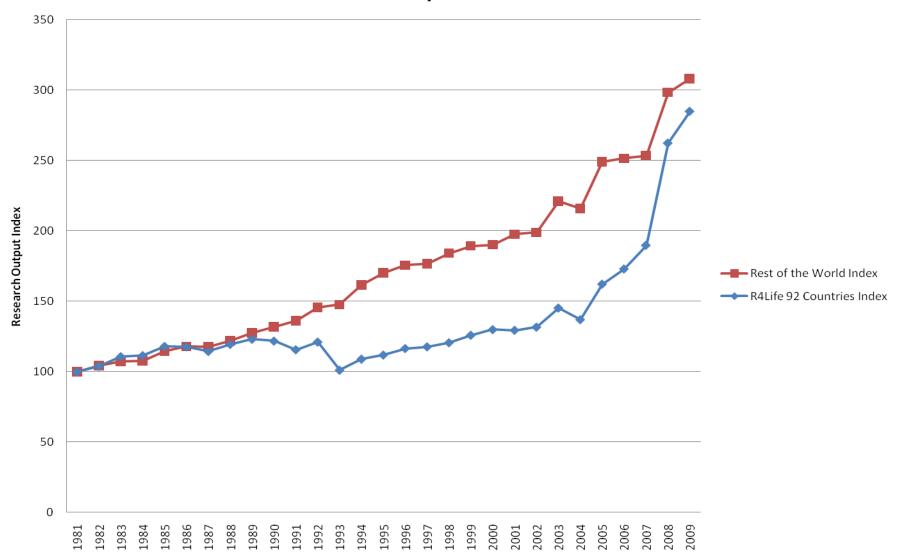
Number of Publications aggregated for 92 R4life countries

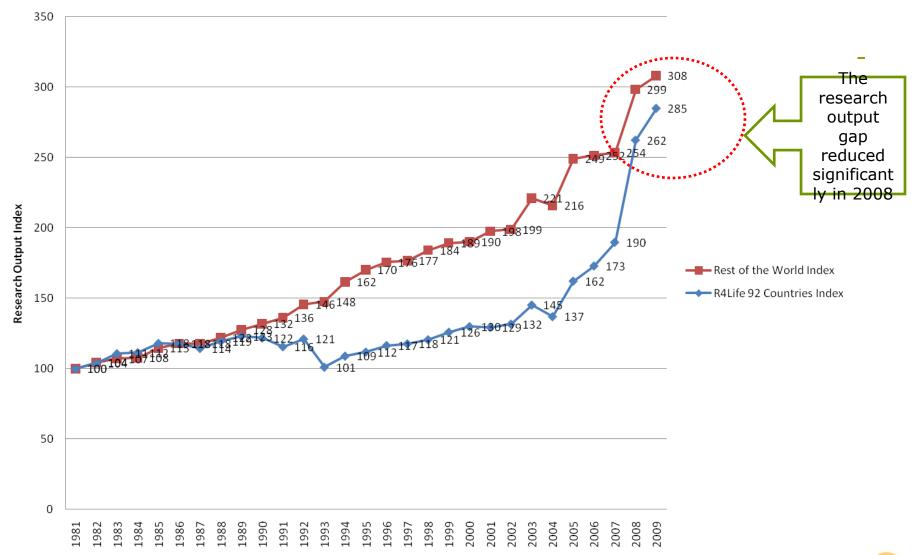


Research Output Index 92 R4Life Countries compared to 99 Other Countries
